

Dear Friends of the Eno,

Expanding our Confluence Natural Area will cap an exceptional year inconservation for Eno River Association. In May, we protected the 56-acres now named "Panther's Branch Natural Area," encompassing over a mile of the river and two streams. In June, we secured a conservation easement protecting 29 acres and 3,000 feet along Lick Creek and three streams in Cedar Grove.

Financial support for these projects came from Orange County's Lands Legacy Program (a joint easement holder on the Cedar Grove property), the City of Raleigh's Upper Neuse Clean Water Initiative, and the North Carolina Clean Water Management Trust Fund. We are very grateful for the assistance of these partners, but it was the support from contributors to our Margaret C. Nygard Land Acquisition Fund and Allen Lloyd Fund for the Protection of the Upper Eno that gave us the edge we needed to move with confidence to secure these properties before outside funding was assured. In the case of the Panther's Branch project, these special funds allowed us to meet a quick turnaround required by the property owners' circumstances.

It takes unrestricted funding to support the staff resources to work on projects like these, but contributions to our restricted funds are also essential to our land protection efforts. Please help the Eno River Association position itself to take advantage of the next opportunity by making a year-end gift that inspires you.



In December, the Eno River
Association will be acquiring 22.6
more acres on the East Fork Eno
River, at the same time landowners
Sam and Lynn Hobgood are
generously donating a 19-acre
permanent conservation easement
just upstream. Both acquisitions
will expand our protection of land
around our Confluence Natural Area
northwest of Hillsborough. As a
result, more than 4.75 miles of stream
front and outstanding habitat will be
permanently conserved.

This section of the river is designated as a Nationally Significant Natural Heritage Area. A population of the rare plant yellow giant-hyssop (Agastache nepetoides) grows there and this past summer, NatureServe botanist and Eno board member Milo Pyne discovered purple fringed orchids (Platanthera peramoena) and southern rein-orchids (Platanthera flava) in a seepage creek. Both orchids, as well as the halberdleaf tearthumb (Persicaria arifolia), have not been previously documented in Orange County. The purple fringed orchid is listed by the NC Natural Heritage Program as a Threatened species.

The addition of protected land at the Confluence, along with our new pavilion, ongoing trail construction, and future development of a sensory garden will allow us to connect more people with the river and this special place.

We are grateful to the Hobgoods for making this expansion possible. Funding from Orange County's Lands Legacy Program, the City of Raleigh's Upper Neuse Clean Water Initiative, and the North Carolina Clean Water Management Trust Fund were also critical to making this project possible.



Confluence Pavilion Unveiled this Fall



A beautiful new 30' x 60' pavilion was unveiled to over forty Wildflower Society members at our annual Insiders' Outside After-Hours event at The Confluence on September 22. The pavilion was also the centerpiece of Jambor-Eno, which attracted nearly 250 attendees out to the property on October 7.

The pavilion was designed by Chapel Hill architect Giles Blunden and built by the Hillsborough contractor/builder team of Charles Wood and Don Tupper. The structure, which features a gorgeous wall and fireplace constructed of stone reclaimed from the original homestead, is equipped with storage, lights, and fans. Funding was provided by grants from the James M. Webb Trust, the Burt's Bees Greater Good Foundation, and Triangle Community Foundation.

Future site plans include installing a native plant sensory garden, an ADA-compliant parking pad and walkways, informational signage, and a dog station. We look forward to having you out for a visit!

We Love Those Busy Burt's Bees!




Classic Eno Festival Live on WHUP - 104.7FM

I-2-3 STRETCH!

The Eno River Association needs to raise \$123,000 by December 31, and by making a 'stretch' gift, you can help us get there. Making a stretch gift means challenging yourself to give just a little bit more than usual in order to make a bigger impact.

Did you know? If you happen to be 70 or older, you can donate your required IRA disbursement tax free to the Eno River Association.

So, how does the \$123,000 break down? First, we need to raise the final \$70,000 needed for our operational budget. These funds help pay for essential land and stewardship staff, education and outreach, and other fundamentals central to our mission.

On top of this, we need to raise \$50,000 to rebuild our land acquisition funds. Earlier this year, the Eno River Association zeroed out its Margaret C. Nygard Land Acquisition Fund and Allen Lloyd Fund for the Protection of the Upper Eno to purchase 56 acres on the Eno northeast of Hillsborough. We've partially reimbursed ourselves with private and public grants, but raising just fifty grand more will make us whole again, allowing us to seize the next piece of land.

The final \$3,000 will help us prioritize and implement our stewardship goals for The Confluence Natural Area.

You can help us get there. If you normally give \$35, consider giving \$50. If you normally give \$50, consider \$100. If you normally give \$1,000, consider \$5,000. Together, we can and we will save more of the places we love!

New Education Opportunity - Coming July 2018

Thanks to financing from the Burroughs Wellcome Fund and the Duke Energy Foundation, the Eno River Association will launch an outdoor science and nature academy for middle and high school students next year. This program will focus on high-level environmental science and conservation in a fun outdoor atmosphere. Students will take biological inventories, conduct climate research, and study geology, hydrology, astronomy, and ecology. They will wade in creeks, look under logs, explore the forest, and watch the night sky. They will learn the ravages on the land that come from exotic invasive species and from soil erosion and join the fight to stop both. In other words, their participation in research will be real. Registration will be limited, so stay tuned!

Explore the River with your Eno Friends

Our annual winter and spring hike series will be here soon and is an opportunity to experience the Eno River with others who enjoy the outdoors. Come for fun, come for exercise, come to explore the river and meet new people. All hikes are led by knowledgeable guides. We will kick off the series with the 48th New Year's Day hike at Eno River State Park's Fews Ford Access, celebrating 2018 with steaming black-eye peas, hot chocolate, and marshmallows roasted in the fireplace. Both a long and a short hike kicking off at 2 p.m.

Every Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. through May 13, Eno River Association will host a different hike in the park. Winter hikes will focus on fellowship and exploring the river valley.
